### Welcome Letter From Interim CEO Dahlia Bousaid Cox

#### Dear Friends,

I joined Tech Goes Home (TGH) in 2022, excited to be part of a team working every day to solve an urgent and persistent challenge: closing the digital divide. Since then, advancements in technology, such as AI, have continued to transform how we work, play, and connect with one another, and demand for TGH programming has only continued to grow. I'm proud to have recently stepped into a new role – as interim Chief Executive Officer at TGH – and, as we prepare to mark 25 years of serving people and communities across Massachusetts and beyond, I am humbled by what we have achieved together and what it means for the road ahead.

First and foremost, I would like to thank my predecessor, Dan Noyes, who led TGH from its earliest days through the end of 2024. Dan's vision and determination helped shape TGH into the organization it is today, and he was instrumental in TGH's success, supporting tens of thousands of learners over the past two-plus decades.

That legacy of positive impact continued in 2024. Thanks to our dedicated community of instructors, partners, funders, staff, and board members, TGH reached more people in more places than ever before. In 2024, we served over 6,000 learners, distributed more than 5,700 digital devices, and scaled our impact to 30 cities in Massachusetts. Through dedicated funding awarded by the Rocket Community Fund, we also launched our first-ever program in Detroit, Michigan.

We raised \$8M from public and private supporters, engaged in meaningful discussions with elected officials at the local, state, and federal levels about the urgency of digital inclusion, and, thanks to initial funding from Capital One, launched our Advocacy Community Fellowship Program that will help center the voices of our communities in critical conversations about the future of digital access.

As we work to maintain and build on that momentum, we are acutely aware that national and international circumstances have put additional pressure on community-facing nonprofits. This landscape has presented new and unprecedented challenges, particularly in advancing digital equity. At the same time, demand for TGH programming has never been greater. TGH remains clear-eyed about our mission, and we are working diligently to strategically position ourselves for the future so that we can continue serving as many people as possible in as many places as possible.

Digital equity is the foundation of opportunity for individuals, families, and communities. With your help and dedicated support, my colleagues and I are excited to roll up our sleeves, forge ahead, and ensure everyone benefits from the digital world.

Digital equity is necessary for civic and cultural participation, employment, lifelong learning, and access to essential services."





# TGH Spotlights: Enhancing Economic Mobility

TGH Instructor Ebony Flint believes that the greatest asset to economic mobility and future success is not the Chromebook her learners receive upon completing her course but the confidence they gain upon graduating from TGH, enabling them to navigate the digital world and accomplish their personal and professional goals.

Flint, who teaches digital skills courses at Tribe Called Black, a grassroots organization focused on building cultural wealth rooted in the personal experiences of Black and Brown people,



is deeply invested in ensuring the learners she sees, from ages 6 to 50+, are ready to engage. Before classes begin, Flint prepares her learners with the right skills and mindset to use technology to connect with one another and their communities.

"The more people that have this access and knowledge, hopefully, the more options and exposure people will have," said Flint. Reflecting on her time as an instructor, Flint says she's had the privilege of watching learners who were unhoused use their computer to find shelter or an apartment; older adults learn how to set up their computers to connect with family members online; school-age children become confident about themselves as they explored the Google apps needed for their school work; and learners in recovery gain the skills necessary to land a job or become a recovery coach.

With job descriptions increasingly requiring computer proficiency and as technology integrates into everyday life, digital skills have become a fundamental tool for enhancing economic and social mobility. As a long-time partner and small business owner, Flint says she's grateful for the opportunity to be an instructor, which has helped her to forge new connections and broaden her professional network.

# TGH Spotlights:

## **Promoting Personal Health**

Jamie Jimenez tells his learners to think of a computer like a car: You might be familiar with how it runs, but everything changes when newer versions come out and newer technology is incorporated.

The same can be said for how we interact with the health care system. With the dawn of telehealth services, online prescription platforms, and apps that put everything you need to know about your personal health in one place, health care services have become more convenient for some and daunting for others.



Jimenez says North Suffolk Community Services, where he works in the training department, has become a go-to resource for people of all skill levels to participate in a TGH course and gain core foundational knowledge on how to navigate the digital world. A TGH partner since 2022, Jimenez says that part of his work with learners has focused on leveraging technology to connect with mental health services.



1 in 5 graduates are older adults (aged 55+), gaining the tools to navigate healthcare systems and telehealth with greater independence "The resources we discuss include behavioral health services, included but not limited to how to look for support during a crisis via Community Behavioral Health Clinics as well as recovery center support," said Jimenez. "After we review the resources samples I provide, we dive into any resources the group wants to look for and we go from there."

Jimenez recalls personally walking learners through the process of accessing MyChart, a digital healthcare portal that enables patients to book in-person or virtual appointments with their doctors, communicate with their physicians, request prescription refills, access their personal medical information, and more.

"I love the fact that it's an agency that not just focuses on the training itself but also focuses on being able to provide someone with a device and access after the class," he said.

# TGH Spotlights:

# **Elevating Education Opportunities**

For the past seven years, **TGH** has been grateful for the ongoing support of Liberty **Mutual Foundation**, which has enabled TGH to scale its work and reach more young people and their families than ever before.

Education is a life-changing experience, and technology has forever changed how that learning journey will unfold. More than ever, access to a reliable internet signal and a laptop or tablet has become crucial to completing homework, writing reports, or developing presentations for class.

In 2024, TGH hosted numerous education-focused courses where students and their parents learned how to navigate technology together and apply those skills to school assignments. Support from the Education Initiative helped drive meaningful moments where TGH learners showed their mothers and fathers how quickly they answered math problems via an educational application. These moments were also educational experiences for the parents, who gained an understanding of how their child is utilizing technology to complete school assignments and can, therefore, jump in to offer assistance if needed.

The Education Initiative, created in 2007 with a unique lens focused on elevating educational opportunities for children, has been an integral partner to TGH's work. With nearly \$400,000 in support, TGH's digital skills programming drives better educational outcomes and eliminates barriers, allowing more parents to be involved in their child's academic future.

# **TGH Spotlights:**Celebrating Civic Engagement

Whether registering to vote, connecting with elected representatives, researching the best schools for your kids, discovering services that could lead to stable housing, or winning that next competitive grant for your small business, having experience with a laptop or tablet can make a big difference. Going a step further, longtime TGH instructor Steve Derosier says digital citizenship and one's ability to access civic services is a right.



"As American citizens, our revolution is founded on the issue of 'representation' and anyone not connected or unable to manipulate modern technology, especially as age slows us down physically, is effectively marginalized at best and definitely unrepresented at this moment in history," he said.

Derosier, Superintendent and Supervisor of Attendance at Boston Public Schools' Department of Opportunity Youth, says the vital connection between comfort with navigating the digital world and civic engagement was acutely felt by the parents and students he served during the global pandemic when face-to-face opportunities and access to city and school services became more difficult.

"The heart of [TGH] pours itself out in service to the local community," said Desrosier. "There is accessible learning and tools available for families and entrepreneurs alike, and I am proud to have played a small role in supporting TGH's mission in my city."

of graduates are registered to vote in Massachusetts Today, civic engagement and participation has a stronger digital component than ever before. Classes at some schools, particularly in higher education, are hybrid; government hearings are streamed online and held via Zoom; and distinguishing real news from misinformation is becoming harder.

Desrosier credits TGH's digital skills programming with helping to carve pathways for better representation and engagement across civic life. As part of the first cohort of TGH's Advocacy Community Fellows, Desrosier made a personal commitment to highlighting digital inequities and advocated for why digital access — particularly affordable internet — is a crucial ingredient for a healthy democracy.

## **TGH Spotlights:**

### **Highlighting Housing Attainment**

The belief that digital literacy is the foundation to all opportunities in life embodies why TGH instructor Rita Lara cares so deeply about her work and the learners who have walked through the doors of Maverick Community Landing Services (MCLS).

MCLS, nestled in a vibrant, colorfully-housed Latino-dense neighborhood in East Boston, touts itself as a "tech-forward community center" and offers instructions for TGH courses in



Spanish as well as English. Lara, who has been Executive Director for 10 years, says this approach to teaching digital literacy skills has allowed her to meet her learners, predominantly from immigrant, public housing, or formerly incarcerated communities, where they are, and reach a population deeply impacted by housing insecurity.

Obtaining housing assistance or services can be daunting for any family. The barriers are even higher for people unfamiliar with the digital platforms that exist to simplify a search for affordable housing.

"Digital literacy skills taught to people are being used to stabilize families," she said. Lara added that digital skills developed in TGH courses have strengthened her learners' abilities to find permanent housing for themselves and their loved ones.

Lara is thankful that TGH continues to engage communities with the highest need for digital literacy, providing them with the necessary digital devices, access, and skills to improve their chances of finding a stable and secure home for their families. "The tablets provided to people most in need are vital to bridging the digital divide."



## Welcome to Detroit

Following 20+ years of proven impact in Massachusetts, Tech Goes Home launched programming outside the state for the first time, bringing our trusted, community-driven digital inclusion model to Detroit. At the invitation of local leaders and in partnership with the Rocket Community Fund, TGH began training local instructors and delivering programming to equip 200 Detroit residents with essential digital skills.

In Fall 2024, Tech Goes Home launched its first Detroit-based instructor training, a pivotal step in expanding our proven model beyond Massachusetts. Conducted in partnership with Black Tech Saturdays, the City of Detroit, Connect 313, and Peer 2 Peer University, the training equipped a cohort of local leaders to deliver high-quality, culturally responsive digital skills programming.



# Advocacy

Tech Goes Home partners with local, state, and federal leaders to advance people-centered policies that increase resources and ensure equitable access to digital tools, skills, and opportunity.

Through testimony, thought leadership, and coalition-building, TGH works to advance policies and investments that close the digital divide. This year, our team shared



insights and elevated community voices at the Massachusetts Legislative Poverty Commission Hearing, NDIA's Net Inclusion Conference, the MassCUE Spring Conference, and the ConnectHomeUSA Summit. We also joined panels hosted by key partners, including the Massachusetts Broadband Institute, Verizon, and the National Digital Inclusion Alliance.

# TGH Advocacy Community Fellowship

Launched in 2024, the Tech Goes Home Advocacy Community Fellowship was created to ensure that the individuals most impacted by the digital divide are shaping the policies and systems that affect their lives. The Fellowship equips a cohort of TGH learners and instructors with the tools, confidence, and connections to advocate effectively on issues that matter to them and their communities.

## Government Technology: New Digital Literacy Course Offers Free Computers

The launch of TGH's digital skills programming at the Nevins Memorial Library in Methuen, Massachusetts, caught the attention of the national publication Government Technology. The program trained library staff to lead three classes tailored to adults and seniors, another focused on small businesses, and a third focused on providing digital skills to young children.






## FY24 Philanthropy/Revenue
